Mr. Macfarlane, during these proceedings and shortly thereafter, heard sufficient to justify his opinion that the Government was the ally of the rebel, Langaballa, and had been giving him assistance. Mr. Macfarlane consequently moved up all the force under his own command, and was met by the rebels, led by Captain Allison, until he had formed a complete encampment on the suspected territory. This accomplished, the Chief and his Council were met by Mr. Macfarlane. When all were assembled, the Magistrate addressing the Chief, said: 'You are aware of the sheltering a number of Langaballa's people, and some of your own of his family, particularly his favourite wife.' After some parley, the truth of the charge was admitted, and Mr. Macfarlane, who had received full liberty of action from Sir B. Pine, then told the assembled representatives of the tribe that they had violated what they knew to be their duty, and had broken the law by harbouring the friends and property of the enemies of the Government, and that therefore they must now pay a fine of 200 l. ad. ... (Detailed account of the trial and sentencing follows) ...

It appears that this chief, Umpilo, had been divided into two sections. A small section, containing only about 2,000 people, is under the chieftainship of Tanta. The other section, which is much larger, has Umpilo for its chief, and it is this latter portion of the tribe which had given reason for suspecting it of insubordination.
Though surrounded by the army of Mr. Macfarlane, Umpilo and his Indians dared to hesitate to comply with the demands of their Magistrate, and in consequence Mr. Macfarlane, with a general company of men, suppressed the incipient rebellion in the but, by ordering his forces to capture the whole of the tribe, to disarm the entire tribe, and to take the Chief and his Council into custody. On Friday last, over 5,000 head of cattle had been captured, and more than 200 guns. No casualty had occurred, except the death of one of the men of the Government. Mr. Macfarlane, however, without doing any injury, and one of the rebels ventured to strike one of the Kafirs, who instantly shot him dead for resisting.

To the wisdom of Sir B. Pine in giving Mr. Macfarlane full power, and to the smart energy of the able officers, the colony owes the most important success of the war. For not only was the rebellion prevented from spreading, which it was likely to do from the weakness which was the greatest expression of the Kafirs' spirit in the past, but the Kafirs were thus the most of proving to the whole of the Kafirs in the colony that whatever head and hand trifling there may have been in the past, the Government was determined to take another and a more manly course of action; that unless implicit obedience was yielded to his commands, His Excellency would not hesitate to employ the force he had at his disposal, and that those who dared to defy or question it might expect active and severe retribution.

Had Mr. Macfarlane wanted to argue the case in this instance, as was done in Langaballa's case, the law would have extended to the rebels, and the Government would have believed that the fine would be paid, the men of the tribe and all their cattle would have escaped up the mountain passes, to join the rebels, and to make the Government's life wisely took the precaution first to invest the location, so as to render escape impossible, and then the demand was made, when it could be promptly answered. We have good grounds for stating that Mr. Macfarlane again and again urged that precisely similar steps should be taken in Langaballa's case, and that the Government should not allow other threatening demonstrations were made against the tribe; but his advice was set aside, in favour of other and more timid courses, and the Government's policy has been most unsatisfactory, and may yet prove more disastrous. Mr. Macfarlane's promptitude of action has demonstrated the propriety of the steps he took in this instance, and that to deal with the Kafirs, and successfully, no choice should be left between instant obedience to constituted authority, or the alternative of a more doubtful one, that had Mr. Macfarlane not had his hands tied for many months in dealing with the fugitive rebel Chief who was subsequently captured in his hands, and who, if not killed, would long ago have brought him to his knees, deposed him, and broken up his recalcitrant tribe?

We confess when we learned that Sir B. Pine intended to accompany the Expedition, we felt considerable regret that he should have left it to his duty to leave the seat of Government, and to be absent from the population, how useless and dangerous it was to parley with contumacious Chiefs at the head of powerful tribes, and because he has had to do with the same Chief, Mr. Macfarlane, who demonstrated the efficacy of a prompt and an energetic, more humane policy. We hope Mr. Macfarlane's advice will be fully followed, and that the Government will not allow the tribe will be broken up, and that the location it occupies, as well as the location of Langaballa, will be declared forfeited, and will not again be occupied by Kafirs, but that the Government will see that it is taken to place European settlers on the lands.
While Mr. Macfarlane was teaching the Kafirs the salutary lesson they so much needed, Major Durnford, and Sir B. Pine's Private Secretary, as the representative of His Excellency, by the Rev. Mr. Smith of Estcourt, and by detaching the 79th Regiment, were ordered to retrace the Pass from which the gallant Major had been obliged to retire, with the loss of three gallant Volunteers and his Kafir interpreter. The Kafirs, however, were not to be deterred, and gave their burial. They found they had all been stripped, but had not been mutilated: a grave was dug, the minister read the burial service, and the military band, in accordance with the usual usages, and the remains of the three brave young men

were consigned to their last resting-place, on the rugged mountain side, where they fell in the discharge of a sacred duty. It would be worthy of the event to mark the grave with the Government's flag, and to erect a monument in after years, to indicate the spot where these brave Volunteers fell in defence of their country. It is not to be heard whether the Government had any intention of erecting a monument, and whether any such was made for it. It is not likely that once a Kafir, who had stood so bravely, as Major Durnford, and the other gallant volunteers, would probably say what was done respecting his remains.
The management of affairs here has excited the disgust and condemnation of the people of Mount Catter, for one of them writes as follows:—'I cannot imagine what the Government has been about, they seem to have advanced only eight miles in so many days, and now do not seem to have the slightest idea where the rebels are.'
