53 Ilanga li ka Mbete - this is the name of a great famine which occurred in Zululand about the year 1861. It got its name because of people leaving their homes and going to pick and feed on figs etc. They used to be discovered by the marks they left in the dewy grass [dew - umbete], and after the men were killed off their women and children were taken away and appropriated by the murderers.

[In Swaziland (per John Gama²) the same famine was known as indhlala ka ngongoni. Ngongoni is a grass of the unsingizane type, which was ground to powder and eaten.]
