A unique way of fishing in the Panlaung River (meaning the pine-colored river) is by means of native rivers with fish hooks (short iron gaffs with a line 2 ft long attached), which they put into, carrying it in one hand, and hunt the fish under the water at the bottom of the river. The river is broad (about 400 yards across) and deep, and runs between jungle rocks with a sandy bed. Two long boats are employed (one on each side, each having a long bamboo pole, and they have a long rope, made of bamboo and grass platted in, like barbed wire, and weighted with big stones, about every ten yards, which they let down to the bottom of the river. These boats go up the river and let down the ropes, and beat the river and frighten the fish to one side, and then close into the bank, enclosing a space with the rope. Here the rivers are ready to rise in, and hunt the fish (about three men at a time). After being under water about twenty seconds they come up, and if successful drag up the fish they have gaffed holding the line behind them. Some of the fish are small, about 1 lb; others run to 20 or 30 lbs. The rivers take it in turns, and when up they warn themselves at a fire on the bank.

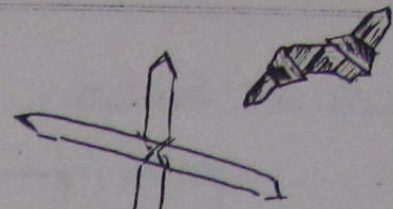
