198 Mluni Maziya; chief of the Maziya, in the Lubombo foothills  
of central eastern Swaziland.

199 Shuter and Shuter: publishing house in Pietermaritzburg, Natal.

200 Magomu: inspector of schools.

191 Mangwaneni: interpretation of the testimony of Simbimbe Ndlela suggests that Mangwaneni was the name by which the point of origin of the Swazi royal house is known, and that it lies east of the Lubombo Mountains across the Phongolo river. (SWOHP, Royal Collection, edit. pp. 17-20.)

192 Ndebele: the name given to the followers of Mzilikazi who branched off from the Zulu kingdom in the early 1820s, and who eventually came to settle in the area that is Zimbabwe today.

193 kaNyanga: possibly should be kaYanga (see note 194).

194 kaYanga: the place of Yanga.

195 Mahlalela: a common Swazi sibongo according to R. Patrick, the Mahlalela people are related to the Maziya. They occupy an area on the northern Lubombo.

196 Domatsocha - border town of north-eastern Swaziland, named after ~~the~~ early Mahlalela chief.

197 Matsenjwa (variant: Mathenjwa): a common Swazi sibongo. The Matsenjwa people live on the Lubombo, near the Ngwavuma river.

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181 Nkholi: lit. king. In some cases this word is used as a respectful form of address, and in such cases, its use derives from its significance as one of the sinanatebo of the ruling Dlamini.

182 Jokoti: the only Jokoti who we have been able to trace was either a brother of Malunge (one of Samhlobo's brothers) or a son of Samhlobo, who conspired against Mawati (Matsebula, History, new edition, chart opposite p.8, p.35).

183 Mtalatala: considered by some sources to be the Swazi founding ancestor.

184 The original hao (ku)gaca, to hang, as around the neck.

185 umntwana: lit. a child. Title for all the royal offspring until the heir is chosen, after which he is the only umntwana, until his installation.

186 It is not clear from the original who 'he' is.

187 Matsebula: possibly Matsebula was present?

189 emaNtshini: i.e. the Ntshini people, who, ~~was~~ before the reign of Shaka, occupied the area around present day Utrecht.
