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

was to have established a regular depot, for labourers who wished to enter Natal, such men to be forwarded by me to an Agent for Government in Natal Myself to receive a salary, as I did in former years, from Government, and all labour to be registered as allotted to those engaging them, such employers to pay a fee per head to Government to rate /?/ according to terms of service, in fact a modifyed sum of the present Coolie emigration system, this would I feel confidant secure to Natal a constant labour supply, and it would put a stop to Natal being overrun with loafers and vagabonds which is sure to be the case if something is not done soon to check this.

He held this appointment previous to the Zulu War at a slary of £300 per annum and a fee of 2/6 for each labouter introduced, for which he had to fixed them at five depots along the route. In 1878 he introduced 2557 natives for whom he received the 2/6 fee amounting to £319/12/6 in addition to his salary. In 1880 he was reappointed but without slary and received a fee of 5/- each on 2539 men equal to £634/7/6 and in 1881 he receive d £483/7/6. In the year 1882 the fee was reduced to 4/- and he received £425. After this the immigration stopped and in 1884 he gain offered to carry it on but asked 25/- ahead, he was offered 5/- bur declined it.

Department would have to be so reduced that the maintenance of the roads in anything like efficient repair would be an utter impossibility.

You must, however, be well aware that the offer of high wages will not be any solution of the native labour difficulty; if such had been the case you would have had no difficulty in supplying the nativesrequried by me for the Railway Exstension and yet you had to send to Zululand to obtain those natives. You must also be aware that the agents, employed by the Railway Contractors to obtain native labour for them, obtain it, as a rule, by paying the chiefs so much a head for the natives they supply, thus proving that the chiefs areable to supply the labour, if paid for so doing, but are unable to supply it when ordered to do so by the overnment.

You allege, in other papers, that the Chiefs have now less power than they had formerly and that this is one of the principal reaons why they are unable to supply the labour requried by the overnment, but surely the R.M.'s EM or A.N.L's could, on the representations of a

chief, punsih any natives who refuse to obey his orders.

I ask you to px lay these papers before HE at once because I have been urged on other papers to use every endeavour to maintain in good repair the main roads in continuation of the lines of railway, and I desire HE to know that I cannot maintain the roads without a plentiful supply of native labour."

"Forwarded for YE's consideration. The main paers on the labour question are still with the CE. I regret to say that I have now requisitions for over 200 natives for the Cln Engr which I have been unable to supply; the various RMS reprting that they could not get them, as all or nearly all the young men, who were not watned at home for planting the crops, were either already on the road works or were away at the Diamzond & old Fields, & working on the railway extenstion.

Last year at this time there were about 1200 Nativesprivded by x me for the Col. Egr, and now there are I beleive over 2500 at work. If it were possible to call out narives living ixx on unoccupied farms the task of providing Natives would be a good deal easier, but even then I think the wages given should be about the same as that current in the Divisions in which they work. I had no difficuty in getting the men (200) asked for in a hurry by the R. lway authorities & I have no doubt I could have what way continued the supply atx as the wages were 1/- a day, but I know that I should have the demandsof the Col. 

All farmers / "That your petitioners are all more or less dependent in their farming operations on native labour and knowing this they have from time to time (at considerable sacrifice and inconvenience) located native kraals on their farms, simply for the purpose of procuring a regular and reliable supply of labour, and that now the demand for labour in the adjoining state has become so great, they find their native labourers are constantly breaking their agreements to supply your petitioners with labour and proceeding to the said gold fields, being there able to obtain far higher wages than your petitioners can possibly afford to pay and to their your petitioners great loss and inconvenience."

Your petitioners humbly point out that their native tenants cannot legally leave the Colony in search of labout or otherwise without passes obtained from Government and seeing that you petitioners native tenants are all bound by agreement to supply labout to their landlords and that they have for years enjoyned accommodation by living on your petitioners farms, your petitioners think it hard that they should be now deprived of the labout to which they are rightly and justly entitled through being unable to afford to compete for 1 bour against mining compnaies and others requiring native labour in the adjoining Repulbic.



The obligation of Natives to labout upon Public Works at the demand of the Supreme Chief is no new thing and this obligation has been enforced ever since this Colony has been under English Rule.

The New Code of Native Law sanctioned by Law No 38 of 1890 recongises this obligation. It also give power to the NativeChief, who has calledout Natives of his tribe to labout upon Pulbic Works on the requeistion of the Supreme Chief, to punish any native who refused to comply with his order.

This power to the NativeChief to punish for any disobidience of such order is one which I have long advocated should be given to the Chiefs, as they have under the existing code no such power; and any Native may disobey with impunity an order of the Chief to go to work, issued on the requisition of the Supreme Chief, the only remedy in the power of the NativeChief is to report such disobedience to the Administrator of Native Law, - This was a very undesirable state of affaris. / / The question of wages is as HM's S of S appears to think the next matter involved.

In 1886 however the general rate owing to depression again fell off to a little below that paid by the Government, and then the Colonial Engineer urged that the Government Rate be reduced. I objected on the ground that for many previous years the Government Rate had been far below the ordinary rate current in the Colony and yet the Natives were compelled to work for the Government at a rate far below what they could have obtained from private employers and that I did not consider it either fair or equitable to take advantage of the decrease of the general rate of wages to reduce the Government Rate. The overnor upheld my view at the time. A few months afeterwards it ha ing been necessary to reduce expenditure owing to the falling of Revenue the Colonial Engineer again raised the question of reducing the wages and I felt compelled, owing to the financial condition of the Colony to withdraw my objections to the proposed reduction, which was then carried out. This was in 1886.

The discovery of the Transvaal Gold Fields and the carrying on by the Government of Railway Extension Works created an enormous demand for labour, both in and out of the Colony, and the Natives in large numbers went to work at the Johannesburg Gold Fields and on the Railway

This rate is now the rate upon which Natives are paid, and is equivalent to 15/4 in the Newcastle and Klip River Divisions where the ordinary rate is from 30/- to 35/- a month, while in all the other divisions the rate is 12/6 against an ordinary rate from 15/- to 20/-.

I think that the rate of wages in the Newcasle and Klip River divisions should be raised to 20 - a month and that the rate in all the other ivisions should be 15/- a month.

The root of the trouble is in natives being forced to enter into such agreements in order to obtain land upon which to live and it seems to be thatuntil properly defined locations are set apart for them the difficulty will continue to exist. There is a law in existence - art 2 -55 - which

provides for certain acts by an owner who allows natives to squat upon his land & place certain limitation upon their number but I understand this law has been made inoperative by the Govt. and a farmer may foster a hundred krrals upon his famr & secure all the labor which it is possible to obtain from natives. To my knowledge this is done to an enormous extent by large owners such as Walton & Tathan & the Land & Colonization Coy. The question of native labout is daily growing more serious. Appeals are constantly being made to me to render assistance to residents who are unable to obtain domestic servants & of course with the inability, which is chronic, to obtain the required amount of labor for the Govt. it is hopeless for me to attmept to held the individual."

- 2. This system naturally strikes one, ar first sight, as being wrong in principle as it is in conflict with the principle of the freedom of the subject which underlies all froms of civilzed governments.

 2. ut it must be borne in mind that the native hasnot uet reached.
- that stage of development which permits of his government accroding to the principles which hold in civized communites. He still requries a more parental and restrictive form of government.
- 4. There can be no doubt that the natives thesmelves do not regard the system in the nture of a return to the Government for any benefits recie ed by them, but tather as the exercise of a lawful perogative of the Government, and as consitute inally inherent in the power of the paramount authority. 5. The system is, therefore, the lawful exercise of an arbitrary power, and, if it be exercised justly, cannot fail to be of great value not only in maintaining the prestige of the Government in the eyes of the natives, but also in benefitting the natives themselves, and for this reason:-6 The xx system, in practice, is applied only to the younger natives that is to those who are called 'young men', or izinsizwa'. Now these young men have become habitutated in early life, by their system of cattle herding, to a life of ideleness, and this tendency is accentuated by the traditional custom amongst them which it infradig that the men should perform ordinary manual labour. When not compelled to work they simply idle away their time at their kraals doing nothing; and it is only under strong compulsion hat they can be made to learn the necessity for labour

7. It is quite clear that without work there can be no progress. If, therefore, we aim at the advancment of the natives in the scale of ivilization we must, of necessity, teach them to axix labour; and this power of calling them out to work under a system which they themselves regard as legitimate is a most valuable power in the hands of the Government towards the attainment of this object.

8. As an instance of the exercise of this power amongst the natis themselves, with the object of beeneftiing the material status of the tribe I may mention that the Chief John Dunn, who rules over a large native population in the Zulu ountry, compels the young men of his tribe to go out to service

under private employers."
