The state they are depuated by the Government of the New Republic in Zululand to speak to and to consult with the authroties in the Reserve respecting the late proceedings of the Chief Usibebu, and to make such representations repsecting other matters as to them may appear necessary.

The Hnad in document signed L.J.Meyer Acting President, dated at Hloban, New Republic, the 15th September 1884, authorising them to p proceed to the Reserve on the business stated.

Mr Esselen says that the Boer committee, haveing ascertained that

Usibebu was the real stumbling-block and obstacle to the establihament of peace in Zululand, sent a force against him which reuslited in his retreating into the Reserve; that shortly after this sibebu teturned from the Reserve, and on the way to his kraal put"to death several of the Usutu people. Upon that the Government of the New Republic, which had by this time been established, sent a Commission to Usibebu to endeavour to arrangme matters with him in a peaceful manner. The Commission, on arrivaing at his palce, found him gone, and ascertained that he had gone into the Reserve. The Commission then joined an sutu force which had come up to them, and peentrated the country to where the two Umfolozis join. The Commission after this returned to the Boer Lager. /Subsequentty it was learnt that Z had not crossed the border but was on the Reserve and the Usuthu wanted an attack to be launched - but fearing a violation of the Reserve which the Govt is most anxious to avoid it was refused. / "The Government therefore sent this depuation to aquaint the ResComm with the circumsntaces, and to consult with him respecting them in order to avert the threatenining danger caused by "sibebu remaining just immediately ouside the Reserve border. /We now learn that since our departure Z has crossed - is he to remain here permanetly, will he be prevented from distunging and attoking the country beyoun the Mlatuze. Reply /He and hispeople are here as refugees and are strictly prohibieted from using the Reserve as a base for operation againt axxxxx territory beyound the Reserv's boundaries. Depatuion expressed satifaction and said it was their intention to restrain people on their side violating the Reserve border ._/

Does not knw how Grant asserted that HM troops were to attack Uuthsu, as Y Excellency knows that everything was done to avoid the employment of trrops

I have also to observe that no one ever disputed the right of any of the Zulus in the Reserve to continue in the peaceful occupation of the land they were on, but whilst this right was acknowledged, and which was secured the them when theReserve was established, it was expected that they would recognize and sumbit to the paramount authority of HMG ewithin the territory.../and this rights was extended to those Zulu who were not suthu and who far out numbered the usuthu. he usuthu would not submit nor would they allow the others to live in peace which necessitated the measures of May which were / "to check hostility and aggression."

Osb says he

"Mr Grant did not advise the Chiefs to conform to the law of the land and thus secure their right to occupy, but by his own showing he only urged them to betake themseves to a palce of safetyx and await their opportunity to commence an agitation for concessions which would be antagonistic to the terms on which the Reserve was extablished by HMG, and against the wishes of the great majority of Zulus in the territory."

I informed them of the critical position they and their people were in, and that, owing to the misconception of the part of the authorities. they might in a few das find theselves attacked by HM troops, and I advised that, in order to prevent the probablitity of misunderstanding, these Chiefs and their people should at once care cross into Cental fululand, taking care to first assure the authorities that their withdrawal from the the Inkandhla was without prejudice to their lawful cliam to occupy the soil in which they were born, and also without to any action in accoradance with English consitutional custom which, Dinuzulu, in conjunction with the responsible advisers of the Zulu nation, might subsequently take to obtain from HMG a full inquirty into the causes of the recent anarchy, with a view to a restoration of the Reserve in accordance with the statements and understanding arrived at between /Kimberley and C"t at Downing St seeC3466 /

These Chiefs at once strongly disowned all intention of hostility towards HMG. assured me they had only defended themselves against unprovoked attakces which had been made upon them, and declared their readinenss to act upon the advice I gave them.

D'manzi and the Chiers already mentioned at once proceeded to give effect to my wishes, and with their separate ffamilies retired

without any delay from the Inkandhla.

/ One thing prevented the withdrawal of all men from the Nkandla - the rear that C t's grave might be rifled - Grant argued that such things were repugnant to Englishmen but they disbeleived him as they said they said they had seen the grave of Mpande, which they said was rifled wehn Woseleley was at Emahlalatini, under the eyes of miliatry men and John hepstone. His chiar which was buried with him was seen in PMB. They believe that this was done at John Shepstone's suggestion / "and all who are at all conversant with the epth of felling entertained by the Zulus regarding the sacredness of the king's grave con in some measure relize the nature of the national wound thus inflicted.

I have further honour to inform you that the most insturctions have been sent by the Zulu authorities to those who remain in the Nkandla for the purpose of guarding the king's grave to conduct themselves in all espects to your satisfaction; and I shall be glad to be informed if any grounds for complaint exisit, so that immediate steps may be taken to fully meet your requeirements."

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

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

We must be firm and just.

he cla ims in Schedule B show clearly the anlwaful way the sut u make use of the Reserve farx as a base forthheir women and propoerty during the time they were making war inximum. Morevoer they entered the Res from Central Zululand and territoised the loyls here. But for this armedassistance given by the USutu from Centl Zululand and their interference othersie the Nkandhla Usutu would neverhave ventured to begin hostlities in the Reserve. The plundered cattle rom loyals and sent them to Cethral Zululand. They have no right to cattle ezied from them in the Reserve where they were kept unlawfully.

Schedule is a list of Cattle colamed by Doyals - counter claims in fact. The loyl als must be told that though we regret it their losses are a result

of the forutnes of war

With regard to claims; referred to me by usuthu through the Bero Commissioners for cagtle seized in the Reserve I told them that I was jutified and bound to mize cattle when their owners invaded the Reserve and never once did I retaliate. If they wished to claim cattle they had first to restore the cattle they taook from the R4serve to Cethral Zululand. I have had no futher claim "I state...that I was willing at all times to facilitate the collection of cattle due to the "sutu in Cetl Zululand by individual natives in the Reserve & I wild see that justice is done in every disuted claim of the king requriting my interference & further that I would extend every facutly to members of "sutu families at present residing with their friends in the Reserve to join their relatives in Central Zululand should they wish to do so." Numbers of "suthu have come in the last 3 weeks to claim cattle from indivilu Zulu in the Reserve and to remove membersof their family and many claims are being settled.
