Meessages having been going from sb to Z to try and dissuade him from attakcing Somkele. On 3/3 the Res received a message from Z sayong he wwas to attack. Messenger sent to dissdaude and Z replied that he would leave them alone as long as they were in the jungle but if they came out he go against him as they know / were his enemeies and had killed his people" "He must therefwre...attack Somkelei if he came out of the jungle, and he would afterwards submit to be punished by the government if the government thought this act deserving of pushing punishment, for he would rather be punished by the Government than be exterminated by his enemies. Osb tried again for Somkele, was holed up in marshy country round St Lucia and his people were ding of fever and crops ripiening unrepaed in the field. O's messneger said that Z had no reason to complain of his people being killed by Somkele because although five had been killed, they had with 15 others aided Sokwetshata made by four companies of Sokwethsata, and they were killed in self-defecne. Z saw the force of this argument from 0's messenger.

News hoever has just come in of a second invasion of Sokwetshata's country. Whose fault this all is Is not clear but it is likely that

it is Sokwetshata's as it seems as if he attacked Somkelei in Feb and the two invasions by Somkele have been retaliations for this.







Your Excellency is apprised of the state of affairs in the Reserve, where military now are compatible with the urgency of the momen. But in respect of Usibebu I wish to submit to Your Excellecy the following resume of facts:-

1. Shief Uisbebu, finding his assigned Territory literally, overrun, and pillged by the Boers and their allies, and communciation with ? completley intercepted, has been compelled to retreat to his but vulnerable stronghold, where he with a number of his men now are.

/2 His messengers have on several ocassion been murdered. 3 He has no adviser 4 I was elected adviser by him in Wood's presence. 5 I am personally acquainted with him and he has asked to assist him 6 I know all Zululand. 7 "Communciated can be affected" 8 Z has sent messneger to you asking for my ssistance 9 "To Your Excellency I will have been repersented through the country of Colonel Curtis and Chief Dunn in conjunction with this matter.

Independent of my own enthusiasim to resucue Usibebu and as having propor notification to YE, I am desirous of becomin attached to the present Zulu expedition, and turst YE will pleased to do me honor with such appointment, and in such capacity, as You my may in Your wisdom authorise.
