

I believe the trader to be mistaken in what he wat states about the German flag, but I have caused inquiries to be made. In the meanwhile I have recieved reliable information from another quarter that a party of Boers employed in the enspection of alnd for famrs, and apparently of the same party which the Natal trader met with, were long since at St. Lucia Bay and there found the glagstff with the British falg glying, and on a board nailed to the mast an inscription to the effect that the territory was "annexed to Her Britannic Majesty's dominions. The lader of the Boer party thereupon wrote on the back of the board in pencil that the territory belonged to the new Republic.



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


