Dinizulu. who is at present staying at Incozan's kraal near Vrijheid. came in again on Monday, mounted on a white horse, wearing a small sword. His party consisited of Undabuko, Mahanane, Shingani, Zwete, Samula, Petchana, Incozan, Qabete, and Mapela; Somkele, from the Ponkanyoni, one of his strognest chiefs, refusing to attend, being strongly averse to the transaction in any shape. Umnyamana. the Regent, I was told, is also very much averse to Dinizulu's agreement with the new Republic. He was not at either of the three meetings in Vrijheid, on Saturday, Monday, and Tuesday. It is said that but for Undabuko turning up on Saturday the business would have been concluded on that day. Dinizulu brought with /93/ him abbour 150 followers, numbers of the mounted and armed with refiles, and cartridge belts full. B cause of this and the destrucion on the border the Boers were forced to do something in self-defence. But recongsiing the claims of the British overnment they were reluctant to do anything untill the Govt declared they had no responsibity beyond the Reserve and declined to interfere.
