





Another differing account says that Dinuzulu went to protest about the amount of land taken and when this was ignored said that they should at least help take the Reserve from the Englsih. - ulwer thinks it pssilbe that the usuthu were atemepting to bring the Boer and Bri ish into conflict.

he suthu are now full aware of the folly of their actions and they cannot say they were signing in iggorance, being unlettered men, but it was done with the advice of their chosen adviser & B manat. 11/12/84 Bishop Mackenzie of Zululand wrote to me on this and on St Paul's Mission enclosing correspondence between him and Grant After the proclamtion of Zugust last when the Zulu agreed to give 1,355,00 morgen to the Boers there was a brief period when some sort of authority was supposed be held by Dinuzlul and during this time Grant who was styled as representative and adviser of th Zulu nation inserted in Natal newspapers a notice dd 2/9 saying missionaries who desired to return should apply by 30/9 /36/ Macken_ie applied and was infored on 2/12 that Grant and the council of Chiefs had rejected the application respecting Kwamagwaza, and with St Paul's Grant had been desired to communciate direct with Rew Samueslon ackenzie protested stronly as the station had been occupied for 20 years and in the last 5 years £800 had been expended on it.

Osb was asked to comment on this crax correspondence and is enclosed.

/Circumstances or R Robertson leaving Kwamagwaza (3000 souls hristian and others) are as stated by Bp McKenzie. hey remained in Cetral Zululand unti 1 they found that an attack on the station was imminent and then left for the Reserve. The whole mission was possessed by the suthu with farm imple ments, tools, furnitue personla belongins grain. The gardes were destoryed and the houses wrekeed and one of the three houses burnt.

The station at St Palas was not injured and is still occupied by Rev Samuleson. Siteku and a large number of suthu occupied the Kwamagwaza mission and were joined by Dabulamzni who took up his qurarters a few miles off. In November Mr Wilhelm came from the Laager at Holbane and took up his residence at Kwamagwaza asacting commissioner from the took up his quraters in one of the missionaries runed houses. He came to Eshowe with 11 Boers a month ago and they informed me verbally that were commissed to survey a belt of farms in Centl Zululand alon the border of the Reserve, and survey all the mission stations into farms as if they didn't exist Kwamagwaza was already divided up and they intended to do the same to St Pauls / "hey also said that the oer authorities did not amdit any rights of missionaries to stationsituated within the block of land decided to them by Dinuuzlu & the other Zulu chiefs & their adviser William Grant."

/Yesterday on 10/2 theyx Wilhelm informed me that the Boers had now decided to recoginsie the mission stations as farms and to grant them 4000 actes of alnd and the missionaries were to be allowed to return.




