Luderitz on S.E. Africa

No103 The Baron de Pestalozzi to CO 3/7/85

" Referring to my interview with you this morning, I have pleasure in conforming to your wish to express in writing my desires as Agent for Mr. F.A.E.Luderitz, of Bremen, with regard to his property in St. Lucia Bay, North East Coast of Africa - this property consists of 60,000 acres, situate north, west, and south of St Lucia Bay, together with the sole rights of trading, and I should be glad if you would kindly inform me whether you recognize this claim or not, in order to enable me to take the necessary steps to protect Mr. F.A.E.Luderitz' interest."

/Claim not valid as territory was ceded to ~~HM~~ Britain x in 1843
"Colonel Stanley would propose further to inform the Baton that HMG have no objection to Mr. Luderitz or any other respectable person settling at St. Lucia for purposes of trade, if it is understood that he does not subject to the authority of HMG, and on condition that he does not attempt to import guns, ammunition, or spirituous liquors into Zululand or Natal. No exclusive right of trading could however be recognized."

Minutes on 4645/103 "I saw the writer /?/ some days ago, and told him that if he /?/, the matter would be considered - intimating at the same time that the answer would be imp robale /?/ as regards the Bay itself &c.

He showed me a letter from Herr Luderitz saying that Prince Bismarck had told him that he had agreed to recognise his private rights. There is not a word about this in the agreement with Germany, but possibly something may have been said informally ~~in~~ in conversation by Lord Granville which led the Germans to think that we would recognise Luderitz's claim."

Send to the F.O. saying that we propose to reply that the Mouth of the Mfolosi and St Lucia were ceded by Panda to HMG in 1843 and we do not recognise the grant made by Dinuzulu

"I would add however as is in the last page of the C.O. Memo: on the British Claim, that we have no objection to Mr Luderitz or any other respectable person settling at St Lucia Bay for the purposes of trade...."

As the matter ended amicably the F.O. never communicated this memo to the German Govt.

Refers to desps on Boers in Swaziland last April of Joubert and Krogh, the former since re-appointed Commandant-General of the Tvl and the latter being at the time Lnadrost of Wakkerstroom the question is whether they were acting on the part of the SAR or with some prupose of their own.

Joubert was acting Presof the Tvl when Kruger was absent and when the Boers enetered Zululand in Aprol last year / "and it is very gene ally believed that he wqs fully cognizant of the Boers movement." Subsequently he was offered office of President of the NR which was the outcome of that movment. Krogh also took an ctive part in the movement and was first Sec to the Govt of the NR. Joubert eventually refused the office and Krogh retired as Sec and both are now in the service of the Govt of the SAR. /

"But it si thought by many persons that a schme exists, to which Messierus Jouber and Krogh ar no stragners, whereby the NR may bedome strenghtened by the addition of the Utrecht and Wakkerstoom ddistricts of the Transvaal and by the annexation of Swazialdn although the time for matruing and giving effect to the scheme has not yet come. It is possible that their visit to Swa island is connectioned with this /



The Boer , Cass Roberts, has been granted bail and Vear and Roberts have sent me a message stating innocence and claim protection of MMG

/Van der Skeff has appeared and made the following statemen.

Statement by Owen Ellis Roberts on 17/8/85 /

/Was in Central Zululand with Louis Vear when two Boers, Caspar Roberts and Lucas Van der Skeff requested that we go to Dinuzulu's kraal to claim a title in writing to the farms Cetshwayo had given them from Dinuzulu and Mnyamana. They said the Boers had turned them off their farms. They waited a week for the headmen of the Zulu nation to assemble to decide the claims. Mnyamana then called them and told them that Ndabuko had not come but when he did they recieve

for me

a permit to live on farms in in their territory. Vand der Skeff's farm is within that which has been conceded to the Boers: that bounded in the east by a linedrawn from the Nkandi to Insepensi kip through the Izungeni neck to the Mpevane on the Pongola. They said he could come their side of the line and live but that they could not sell the land as it belonged to the Englsih Government. Vear and me were told that we could ~~live~~ ' sit still' where we were as we had lived so long with them. the headmen asked us what we should as the Boers were measuring all their land and driving the people away. Robberts and Vand der Skeff returned to their famrs and were arrested, turned state evidence and told what passed at the meeting with the heamen, and we were arrested on ~~high~~ charges of high treason and improsed. We were tried and relaied if we found 50£ from burghers and £100 ourselves as surties to keep the peace for 6 months. The trial took place on 27/7 and we were realeased on 10/8. Mentions that if it were not for Vear and my restrianing rhe Zulu they would long ago have risen against the Boers.

The Boers have not respected the titles of the German~~x~~ mission stations which the missionaries allege were granted to them by Mpande and confirmed by Cet and ^Dinuzulu. The German stations are those of Emiati, Ekuhlengeni, ~~Em~~ Esihlengeni, Ihlomohlolo, Hlobane. The latter has been absorbed in the farm acquired by Lucas Meyer and the others damaged.

/Refers to his desp of this date says that in private note accompanying Cardew's report of 26/9 he states his report is based on info given him by Captain Nagel, German officer of the 1st Baden Grenadiers, ~~attm~~ who is attached to the German consulate at Cape Town and who appears to have been sent to Central Zululand to enquire about German missionaries there. He told Cardew that he had seen Lucas Meyer who told him that they intended to keep the missions and they would defend them by force. He also saw Dinuzulu who it seems to him had the ~~xx~~ habit of taking stron liquor. He desrided that his name not be mentiond.



At a meeting of the Committee at Mansion House on 5/11/85 the meeting resolved that British authority should be asserted not only at St Lucia Bay but over the adjacent territory which makes it impossible for the Boers to lay out townships in the neighbourhood of the Bay. ~~HM~~ Hopes that HMG will not recognize Boer appropriation of territory into inquiry has been made into alleged cession and, since Britain is primarily responsible for the anarchy in Zululand steps should be taken in concert with the principal chiefs to establish British authority in that country.

No45 Herr E Nagel to Foreign Office (17/12)

"To Her Majesty's Commissioner for Foreign Affairs, London.

The most humble undersigned taked the liberty to ask Her Majesty's Commissioner for Foreign Affairs if it would be permitted to him to submit to HM Colonial Government a treaty, entered into between him and Dinizulu of Zululand, and if Her Majesty's Colonial Government were prepared to allow the most humble undersigned to ring, on base of such a treaty, settlers to Zululand.

The settlers had to prevent the Boers in Zululand to take more than they have a right to do, and in case of war to defend their property on their own expenses, for which they would recieve a certain p  e  e of land, about 100 to 150 acres free.

The most humble undersigned is prepared to who the treaty either in London or in Berlin to HM Consulate, and to explain all the rights and wrongs have done in that part of South Africaxx"
