NO I Indictment that Somhlolo son of Mvundhlana is guilty of High Treason Rebeelion and Public Violence. In that in June and July 1888 at Hlopekulu mountain they committed high treason and 2 on 2/7/88 at Hlopekulu they made war against the Queen and 3 in June and July 1888 he assisted Tshingana in Rebellion against the Queen.

p8 Registrats Record Prisoner pleaded not guilty, on 16/11/88 and WY Campbell withdrew after applying for a month to prepare the prisoner's defence.

17/11/88-19/11/88 39/ witnesses for the defence called. 20/11/ prisoner gave his own defence and 21/11 called his witnesses and judgemnt given on 22/11.

"Eshowe has already ecome a village of some pretensio ns, and the road from Tugela is now a very fair one. / The public buildings are barely sufficient for the requriemnt of theplace, and as the colony devleops, must be gradually increased." /Zululand Police very efficent. £21,579 hut collected at the time coma red with £10, 950 at this time last year and hasbeen paid with "alactrity. The Usutu alone made difficulties, pleading poverty and asking to be exmepted from this year'stax. As however, I was convinced that, in a great majority of cases, this plea was untrue. I directed the Resident to inist on the payment, havingxx leaving him discretion in cases wherer there was real proverty. Thesepeople arenow paying their taxes, and there will probably be but few instances where it will be necessary to exercise indulgence. /Saw the imprionsed chiefs. / "Thesemen had literally no complaints to mak e except that they were not allowedfreedom or, in their own words, to 'see the grass'. / The rationx issued to each of them is large being about four times that of an ordinary European. The thre frist named /N d and Nt / are each a lowed an attendant who brings them their food and does all that they may require. They are averse to taking exercise, but they are permitted to do so outside the gaol whnever they desire at

at propoer hours. he two calls occupied by them are sufficiently commodious, and larger than the hutswhich they ordinarily inhaibt. Indeed thier amsmost solitary grievance expressed to me was that their attendants were not permitted to constantly occupy thesame ceslls astheir chiefs.... I see no rason to suppose that the mild form if impriosnment under which they are detained is having, or is likely to have, any bad effect on their bodily or mental heatlh. / /I am gad to be able to terminate this brief despatch by stating that I believe Zululand to be at present in a state of peace and apparently of contenemtnet."

You then proceed to say that, as private property in land hardly exisits at present in Zululand, the question is pracitally freefrom vested interests but that it appear desirable to the S of S that the Government should have full power to proclaim a pilbid gold field, and to issue prspecting

licenses on any land, the ownder of the land b being compensated for surface damage &C. / /I would beg leve to my, in the first place, that in v iew of the close relations of Zululand with Natal, and in view of the grobable incorporation of the former country in the latter, at no very distant date, it has, as I understand, with the approval of the Sec of State, been taken me a guiding principle, that the Laws enabted for Zululand should, as far as possible, be made to assimilate w with the Laws of Natal. It osul seem that his principle is perhaps more important in its bearing on laws affecting the tenure of land, and the the priviliges and rightsof the owners of land, than on most other classews of Laws.
