From the whole lot received here, a good fifle and six Prussian rifles partly broken, and wair answer from you or Messrs.???? as to their disposal. Your secretary refused at first to take all the guns, but I have managed to alter his determination. From the powder the Kafirs only bring you this time 160 kegs, equal to four pounds each; they would not take more away because they had to carry away goods from two Banians for King Cetywayo, which I do not believe, and have had some trouble and disturbance with your secreta ry ~~about~~ it. This is very annoying, as I have to take all the powder out of the magazine, and when once taken out cannot be returned there, and as I do not like to keep all the powder in my stores, I have had to distribute it, placing it in friend's houses until you send for the balance. I should have thought that your people would naturally have attnded to this matter first and the business with the Banians afterwards; therefore in future you will please explaon if the Kafirs come on your account or on account of the King also. Please credit me with 31. for shipping expenses, and please pay the amount to Messrs.                   . Tenisa tells me that from Miniaso remains some cattle for my account there, whih I should feel obliged by your sending with yours to Natal for sale.?? Yours etc.



## K C JOHN DUNN PAPERS folder Manuscript Room

JOHN DUNN by Domenic Dunn T.S. 1848

/Son of Settler Robert Newton Dunn. Stresses the wild nature of the area in which Dunn settled and the huge task he had in clearing it for habitation. Gives details of his homesteads. 1 at Mtumzini 2 Enswelabapenduli 3 Black Magnete 4 Ensolweni 5 Emdikileni 6 Emoyeni 7 Mlalazi now Mtunizni. Points out the pains he took to live the life of an English gentleman. Discusses Cet/Dunn break up blaming false informers. Mildly Attacks RCAS for his distrotions in Long long ago.

F B Fynney to Dunn Boder Agency 18/5/80 /Thanks him for the offer but the decision which is so important will have to wait even longer while he tries to make up his mind. / I hope you will not think this weak on my part, or an unnecessary delay - but I like the prospect you hold out so much that I am loath to say nay and I really cannot quite determine yet to take the step."

E A Brunner to Dunn 21/8/80 Umsundus

"Bearers are the men who Galloway sent ~~down~~, and who lay a complaint against Lambele for wrongfully taking away their cattle, accusing them having hidden King's cattle. As Lambele did not pass bye here, but is in the neighbourhood and supposed to reach your palce with the cattle to morrow morning, I send the men on to plead their case in his presence or else bring me your Instrucitons. / /I have also a case of hiding King's cattle in hand. Two head were sold for blankets a little while ago by one Magote son of Matuyane. the affair has leaked out and delinquent has brought down

2 head re replace them. Of course this will not suffice and I will send  
for all his ~~remaining~~ cattle according to your laws."

Chelmsford to Dunn Lower Tugela 25/3/79 "I am much obliged to you for  
your suggestions regarding the employment of your men as scouts which ~~will~~  
will be carriedout. / / I think it would be very advantageous if you  
yourslef were to accompany me as far as the Inyazani R. I would not ask  
you to go further. / Wants his experience in Zulu warfare and scouting. /  
"I quite understand that you do not feel justified in running the risk of  
depriving those who look to you ~~for~~ for support of your helping hand,  
but I do not think that what I ask you to do entails any particular risk....

"A Chat about Zululand and the Zulus" by Sigurd Sivertson  
/Reminiscnes not of much value. Gives figures accroding to the ~~xx~~  
Zululand lands Delimitation Report. In 1899 pop was 210,253 calcuated  
on a biasis of just over 3 persons per hut. The coast belts was 151 per  
square mile, middle belt 201 per sq ml and Upper belt 35 per sq ml.  
1 sq mile -- 640 acres / Gives a description of Zululand its history and  
a chat with Dunn not taken

Reminiscnes of John Dunn by Col Sparks

/Dunn was great firends with Sam Benningfiled and he brought cattle dwon  
to be Xululand by Benningfled in Durban.. His first station coming from  
Natal was Mt Enyoni named Magnete 5 miles from the Tugela where his chief  
wife was. The nest was t Inyezane named Udigilene 20 miles from Magnete  
and the thirs was at Engoya named Thwayonduka.

History of John Dunn Son of early Natal settler one of the youngest of  
six children and had to take refuge in the Comet in 1839. He entered  
Zululand in 1853 when 19 years old and traded and shot. Then he took  
office under Captain Walmesly (Wolseley in docuemnt. Sided with Mbuyazi  
and then went to Zululand to calim cattle. He was invited to stay and  
was gi en the Nogye area still saprsel y inhabitated and full of wild animals  
His territory later was extended to the Tugela and this reg was not thickly  
inhabited by the Zulus. /This is a version of Diminic Dunn's story.  
Also fives Dunn's praises - not interesting. Also cantins copies of  
Dunn's diaries.

June 9 1884/? "F Dear Mr Dunn Many thanks for sendin on the two letters from Sibebu. I forward them /oblite ated to the Governor. USibebu sent /? that the Boers & a strong USutu force had invaded his territory & were on the Nongomo. He was expecting to be attacked any moment.

This is very dreadful news.

I have just heard from ~~Umber~~ Umbusu by messneger ~~x~~ /? Hlubi have given Dabulamanzi a propoer licking the latter escaped by abandoning his horse & tetting into some bush & rocks. But Dabankulu ka Lakwazi who was helping Dabulamzni was killed in the flight

E A Brunner Adm Zulu Law Emsundusi Dunnsland to John Dunn Chief 23/9/81

Encloses a letter concerned with the seizure by the writer of the oxen  
of a man Glenn who was passing through the territory. Few days later  
native brings pass singed by Weber giving former permission to search for  
the cattle. Ives details of the case.

J Saunderson to Dunn Durban 29/3/82

"Dear Sir Many thanks for you note, that just reached me owing to my being from home I am sorry I shall not be able to see you in Durban as I should have much liked to do - but as you will see, I had to be in Veralum yesterday - & at Stanger on Friday - so that I could not possibly be in Durban between times. Had I received your note sooner whilst in Veralum which I left this afternoon - I might have

Thanks for your note - I fully understand your name is not to be mentioned. I am right - am I not in stating that eating up parties in & outside Zululand were of continual yearly recurrence. / / You say referring to Xulu impies ('shortly after the one you were in' be sent out against Mangangeni. What was the one you allude to as the one you were in ?

Could you give me the dates of the various ones you name ~~xx~~ - it has a wonderful effect on those who read these if you can make year - month or details. / / Do you remember the one in 1875 against Umtelkwana - any small matter of detail introduced in the reference tells on the English reader - It is wonderful how they swallow such rubbish as 'Their bone' or the use of Zulu terms. / / I am unable to speak from authority but I fancy the head /?/ ~~xx~~ officials / report having half promised Cetewayo a visit home & would like to get out of it if they could.

And even under the present proposal for responsible government - they the Ministers would like to be able to fall back on strong objections, authoritatively made in Natal to Cetewayo return so as to justify themselves toward the swarm of radicals who urge it - now these radicals as supporters are strong - with the Liberal Govt. Yours faithfully Ja Saunderson."

Guy Dawnay to Dunn 15/6/83 House of Commons notepaper

"My dear Dunn I have to thank you not only for a letter, but for a  
of Natal Mercuries, which I have been very gald to get. I have waitied to answ  
till I could report to you some proeceedings, or likelihood of proeceedings, in  
in the House, with regard to Zululand. One was abliged to wait onee more  
for a Blue Book - this has at last been issued and affords the strongest  
possible evidence against the Settlement. Saturday I asked a question on  
the sbject, which I enclose together with the anwer I recievied, and today I  
have given Notice of a Motion for this day four weeks "That in the ipinion  
of this House, the polciy of Her Majesty's Govt with regard to the Restoration  
of Cetywayo to a larger porition of his fromer territory in Zululand, involves  
a direct breach of faith with the chiefs appointed at the former Settlement  
of that country, and is neither conducive to the Maintenace of Peace in  
Zululand - to the welfare or civilization of the Zulus, nor to the Security  
of the Colonista of Nata.' Although H-Beach that it wastod strong he saus  
he will support me / "... if only one could get a majority on the Motion,  
I believe the Vovt would be gald to make a new arragnment in accoreacne  
with the Subbestion I have made in the question I enlcose. I have kept  
on asking questions about the lies that the Natal Witness man has so  
consistently published (Statham?) & had a long one yesterday, .. / but am  
holding it back until his explanation arrives. If you see Zibebhu  
give him my complimetns and congratulations. I shoul like to pay him a visit /  
"I will write again as soon as anything occurs bearing on our Zulu policy, -  
but we can expect little from this cowardly Government - ..."

John Sanderson to Dunn 7/5/80 Shows close connection between this man who

Editor of the Colonist and Dunn. Regrets that Dunn didn't send his letter to the APS before the war and it might have stopped the war and exposed Shepstone's role / "...at all events / it might have / prevented matters going to the extremities they did, and I give you credit for preferring the real good of the Zulus to any personal advantage you may have derived from the turn things have taken."
